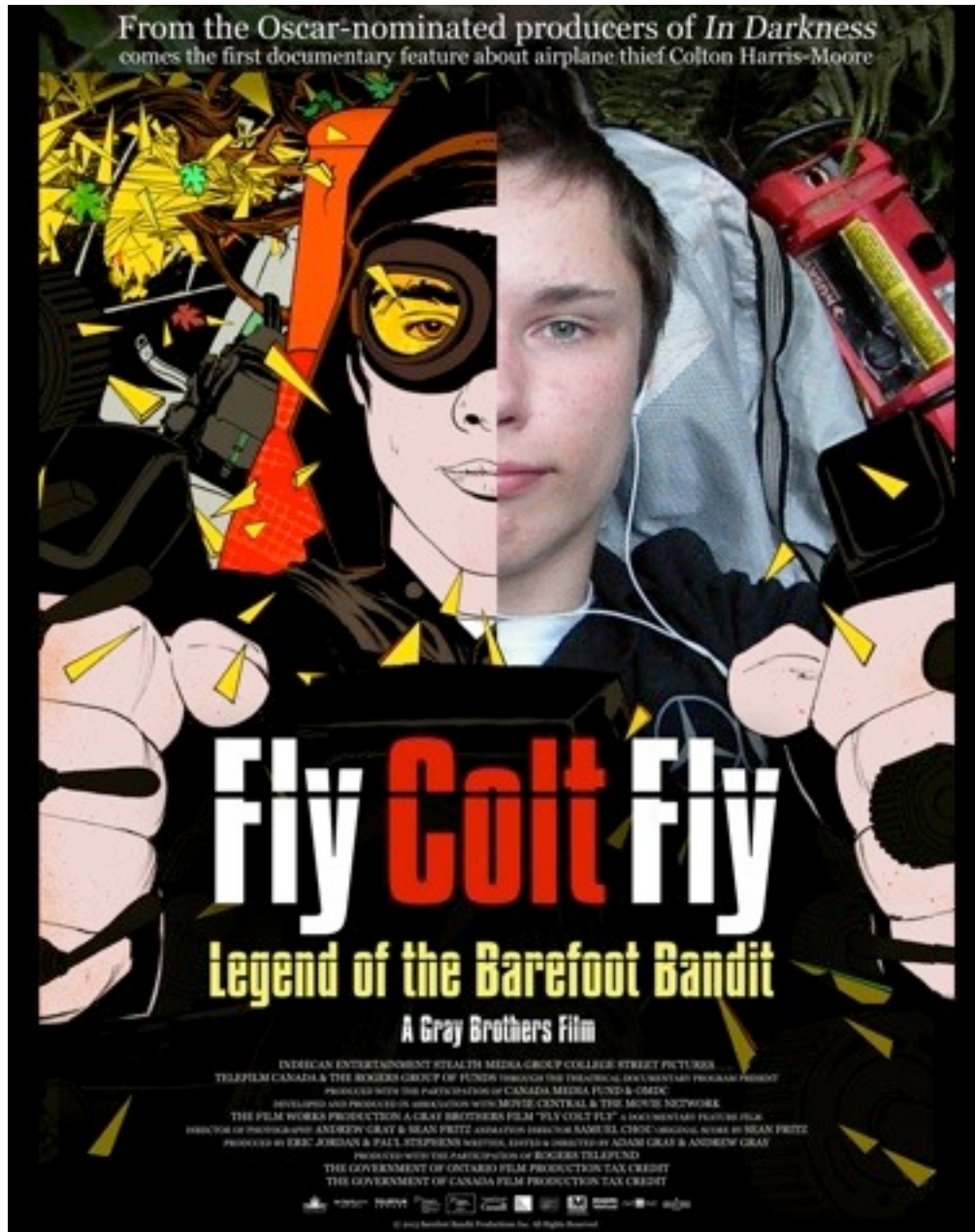

Logline

Colton Harris-Moore had never been in a plane before he hot-wired a Cessna, flew 600 km and crashed in the bush. That was the beginning.

Short Synopsis

Fly Colt Fly is a feature length documentary about American teenage fugitive Colton Harris-Moore, whose superhuman ability to escape capture by stealing airplanes and living in the wilderness made him the modern day folk hero of a new generation. Fusing documentary, graphic novel style animation, and dramatic recreations, the film contrasts the story of a real kid who fell into burglary to keep from starving with his mass media persona, The Barefoot Bandit. While telling Colt's larger-than-life story, this film examines the public fascination with underdog anti-heroes and how fame becomes the kiss of death for these outlaws we root for.

Long Synopsis

Fly Colt Fly is a feature length documentary about a 19-year-old outlaw whose epic journey captured the imagination of the world. It is the story of a young fugitive's rise to international fame, the small town community he tormented, the police and bounty hunters he duped, and his dysfunctional mother exposed to the world. Most of all, it's the story of how an angry teenager, alone, afraid, and living on the razor's edge became a legend.

Brilliant and troubled serial burglar Colton Harris-Moore escaped a juvenile detention facility in 2008, beginning a chase with authorities unlike any other in history. Colt left in his wake more than 100 crimes, including a half dozen stolen boats, at least 10 cars, and 5 stolen airplanes. Colt remained on the run for more than 2 years, with the FBI and Mounties tracking him with dogs, SWAT teams, and Black Hawk choppers. 90,000 "fans" from around the world cheered the teenager on through Facebook. Numerous original ballads about Colt have been immortalized on Youtube, book and movie deals were made while he was still on the run. Colt is a new breed of outlaw folk hero - a pure fugitive, a runner. Though non-violent, his name will go down in history with the likes of John Dillinger and Billy The Kid. While telling Colt's larger-than-life story this film examines the public fascination with underdog anti-heroes and how that notoriety in turn has been the kiss of death to the outlaws we root for.

Combining documentary, dramatic recreations, and graphic novel style animation, *Fly Colt Fly* contrasts the story of a real kid who fell into burglary to keep from starving, and his mass media doppelgänger, The Barefoot Bandit.

Fly Colt Fly plays like a comic book action movie fused with documentary examination and introspection - a chase film about the evolution of a controversial anti-hero and the effect his mythology had on his own fate.

Directors' Statement

The outlaw folk hero represents the life and death struggle for the most basic human need - freedom. Folk heroes are born when the story of an individual's rebellion strikes a chord in the public so deeply that it becomes part of our collective consciousness, part of our mythology. Colton Harris-Moore is the modern rebirth of the outlaw folk hero, a phenomenon not seen in North America since the Great Depression. Fly Colt Fly is about how the public fascination with Colton made him attempt to become the folk hero his fans wanted him to be, and how that transformation became his downfall.

Billy The Kid, Jesse James, John Dillinger, Bonnie and Clyde all fell victim to celebrity. Their initial goal of freedom became secondary to the need to live up to their own legend, a need so strong that even imminent capture or death could not dissuade them from their paths. The real person is consumed by the mythological doppelgänger. Our fascination with these rebels becomes their final undoing. Infamous outlaws are doomed and perhaps that is our attraction to them.

I first stumbled upon the story of Colton Harris-Moore after he had stolen his third plane and the national media had just picked up the story. Colt had vanished into the woods in Washington State and not been heard from in months. While Colt was in hiding, his story went viral across North America. Colt, like his ever-growing fan base, watched on the Internet as his past crimes grew from local news to national legend, until the temptation became too great. Colt reemerged to steal his fourth plane, flying through the Vancouver Olympics no-fly zone, then returning to his stomping-grounds in the Puget Sound Islands where he drew 39 chalk footprints at his first crime scene. Colt had become The Barefoot Bandit.

In spite of myself, I was literally thrilled. I say in spite of myself because my wife is a social worker for troubled youth and I knew that with each crime Colt's future became bleaker. Yet, there was something bigger happening here, mythology unfolding in real time, a story for the ages. Following the exploits of Colt over the next few months on the Internet was the single most exciting news experience I have ever had. I was not alone in my fascination; legions of fans around the world waited eagerly for his next move. They were sharing stories through Twitter and Facebook, creating pop art and Youtube videos. As Colt's tale unfolded details of his sad and tragic past began to emerge piece by piece like a mysterious jigsaw puzzle. The more we learned, the more we empathized with him and the more we wanted him to get away. Colton Harris-Moore was our anti-hero and he lived as much in our imaginations as in reality.

Colt's story presented the rare opportunity to make a documentary that is as much about myth as it is about fact. What happened along Colt's journey might never be known, but perhaps more important is what the world imagines happened. It is public imagination that creates myth and legend. We wanted to make a film that takes the audience on a haunting, atmospheric and iconic journey that explores the boundaries between documentary and fiction, fact and legend. Our intention was to make a film that takes the audience through the same thrilling ride of media and

imagination that Colt's fans experienced while he was on the run. Fly Colt Fly is not just about the greatest fugitive chase in modern times, it is about a social/cultural phenomena, the creation of a folk hero in the digital age.

Colt like all mythological figures, we come to know through the stories people tell about him and by piecing together events, clues and artifacts left behind. Each of us imagines Colt differently - making him our own. To some he is a fun loving adrenaline junkie, to others a hateful sociopathic thug, to others a sad abused kid striking back at the society that rejected him. I believe it is this very ambiguity, mystery and need for imagination that gives Colt's legend its power. Whenever we think we know Colt another piece of information surfaces that forces us to reevaluate who he is and what his motivations might be.

The unwitting antagonist of our story is the media itself, the unrelenting coverage of Colton's spree. Newspapers and local TV began following Colt's crimes in 2007 when he was fifteen, during his first seven-month run as a fugitive with his partner Harley Davidson Ironwing. The story was serialized, and the Internet allowed new followers to travel back in time and watch the story unfold from the beginning. As the story grew, Colt's face was seen on almost every newspaper and TV in North America, making his capture inevitable.

Fly Colt Fly is a cinematic ballad about a kid chasing his dreams against all odds, with the police and media following every step of the way.

The Gray Brothers (Directors)

Adam Gray and Andrew Gray wrote, directed, shot and edited Fly Colt Fly. The Gray brothers have made eleven television documentaries featuring everything from motor sport racing to the paranormal. Their adventurous approach has taken them across North America, Japan, through the jungles of Belize & Mexico, and to remote villages on the African island of Zanzibar. They have interviewed black-ops psychic intelligence officers, been bitten during an exorcism by a witch doctor, and have shot in the trenches of NASCAR pit crews. Previous Gray brothers films include The Nightmare, The White Mountain Abduction, and Remote Viewing. Fly Colt Fly is their first feature length documentary.
